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"Chappelle's Show" Viewing Triggers Bias Incident

A Pomona College sophomore's viewing of a skit portraying a blind, African-American white supremacist triggered a bias-related incident alert late Wednesday night.

It was the fifteenth such alert so far this month, the highest amount since records were started last semester.

Eyewitnesses and Campus Safety logs indicate that the bias-related student, who is Caucasian, was tittering in a computer lab in the Lincoln building after 10:30 p.m. while watching the controversial clip on a video-sharing website.

But his bias-related sense of humor was not universally shared.

Several students in the room were appalled by the bias-related sketch, from a 2003 episode of comedian Dave Chappelle's eponymous, now-defunct Comedy Central TV show, which depicts the African-American actor as an elderly, blind white supremacist author who is unaware that he is, in fact, black.

The video clip, which has since been removed from the YouTube website due to a "terms of use violation," includes gratuitous use of the racially inflammatory "N" word.

The offended students reported the bias-related incident and the identity of the bias-related student who was watching the clips to

Pomona administrators through a 24-hour, bias-related telephone tip-line that has been established for "prompt response to offending materials," according to the Pomona website. The description does not elaborate on what such materials would be, or what any such response would entail.

Remarkably, within minutes of the bias-related incident being reported, a team of bias-related incident operators arrived on scene, collecting bias-related

evidence and interviewing witnesses. Some wore Hazmatsuits. A rectangular chalk outline was drawn around the Apple-brand computer on

which the bias-related clip is believed to have been viewed.

The college's bias-related threat level was simultaneously raised to orange, or "high," from yellow ("elevated"). E-mails and SMS text messages from Pomona president David Oxtoby were sent to students, staff, and faculty indicating that a suspect had been apprehended and would be brought before a secret tribunal known as the Judiciary Board within a time period that would not be discussed publicly.

"Furthermore, Dean of Students Miriam Feldblum and a team of specialists are currently

Pomona Forms Subcommittee to Address Increase of Unspeakable Violence on Campus

In response to the recent increase in unspeakable horrors and unconscionable acts of violence on Pomona's campus, Campus Planning and Maintenance, the Dean of Students Office, the Dean of the College and Campus Safety, and the Dean of Landscaping have formed a subcommittee. The subcommittee will meet to discuss the forming of a subcommittee that could discuss ideas for improving campus safety with regards to the recent atrocities. That subcommit-

tee, arson, murder, kidnapping, racist graffiti, egging of academic buildings, and swirley-giving, we have no choice but to form an exploratory subcommittee. The safety and well-being of Pomona students is our utmost priority, and we feel that this committee will recommend a satisfactory solution for our problems."

Bowen Patterson Declares Pomona "Unsustainable," Files Resignation

In a shocking and abrupt move, Pomona College Sustainability Coordinator Bowen Patterson submitted a letter of resignation to President David Oxtoby just before 5 p.m. yesterday, along with a report that detailed the "failure" of Pomona's sustainability efforts. The letter began, "Pomona is simply unsustainable, and I can't coordinate something that doesn't exist."

"Think about it," said Patterson, in an exclusive interview with TSL. "We get like, five inches of rain a year, and this place looks like the f-ing secret garden."

Administrators were blindsided by the move. "I'm simply shocked," said Oxtoby. "I wish she had given us, you know, like two weeks notice or something... After all, what's a college without a sustainability coordinator? It's simply unheard of in this day and age."

Dean of Students Miriam Feldblum expressed similar concern, saying, "Certainly Bowen's departure leaves our community with big shoes to fill. Even if Pomona is unsustainable, we are committed to striving for a diverse, supportive, and sustainable community."

"You may ask, how can Pomona be sustainable even if it's unsustainable? Well, the act of sustaining an institution relies on a lot of factors," continued Feldblum. "It relies on the willingness of the community to strive for sustainability, even if the college is, you know, 'unsustainable' by some objective standard. Sure, I'm surprised by the results of Bowen's report, but I don't think the fact that Pomona is unsustainable is detrimental to the college's mission, or even to our continuing efforts toward sustainability."

Students, for the most part, demonstrated different reactions

than the administration. "I am saddened by this report but unfortunately not at all surprised," said Leslie Hempstickler PO '09. "I simply have no choice but to terminate my support for this unsustainable institution. I am about to graduate though; it can't hurt to be unsustainable for like one more month, right? That carbon footprint should be pretty small."

"Oh, I always thought Pomona was unsustainable," said Jordan Cohen PO '12, as he flickered on and off the lights in his room. "Have you seen the trash cans in these dorms on Sunday morning? That can't be sustainable. I mean, we all try to do our part, but I just don't think humanity is that sustainable. Say, can you open that refrigerator door? I like the white noise when I sleep."

According to Patterson, she is now looking for a "real job," and plans to enroll in law school in the fall.

Senate Briefs

April 1, 2009

Finley Finishes Thesis After Four Years.

This week's meeting was called to order by President Eliza Finley '03 at 4:59 p.m., despite the absence of most senate members, who were finishing their game of pool at the coop. Before getting down to business, Finley announced that after four years of work, she had finished her thesis on the benefits of subversive fascism in educational environments, titled "Is our children learning without despotic leaders." Her thesis advisor and Director of Smith Campus Center, Neil Gerard, remarked that he was glad to be rid of her.

Rhett Saves Senate... AGAIN

Finley then introduced a slew of new proposals to help with the financial crisis impacting the college. Finley quickly brought the meeting back to order, screaming "I am the decider!" After the senators calmed down, Finley said that she would not be "misunderestimated." The senate concluded the meeting in their usual fashion, leaving much to be decided and desired.

working around the clock to contain the threat from this unacceptable act, which does violence to our community standards as a college community that values sustainability, safe spaces, open space, discourse, diversity and/or other ambiguous buzzwords," he wrote.

It is believed that the bias-related student acted alone, the e-mail noted.

The college has faced some backlash for their actions from a full-throated group of Internet blog writers, who have taken the incident on as something of a cause

célèbre.

"The headstrong, overtly aggressive action is further evidence - as if we needed any - of the hegemony of this post-structuralist, Marcuse-influenced liberalism run amok," wrote Andrew Breitbart, a conservative commentator and *Washington Times* columnist. "I submit to you that the Claremont Colleges are palling around with the most radical element in American politics today - the Black Intelligentsia - and that's what led to this."

He did not offer evidence to support those claims, which is a blogger's prerogative.

The bias-related student, protesting the school's actions in a brief phone interview with *The Student*

Life, disputed that there were any political or racist overtones to his actions.

"This is utterly ridiculous," said the student, who asked that his identity be withheld on the advice of counsel. "I was procrastinating. This has nothing to do with politics or race. I just thought it was funny, and I didn't really want to do my Comp-Sci homework."

He added that he was grateful to the Internet blog writers who defended him.

"I don't want to get emotional about this, but these nerdy, entrepreneurial white men are the torchbearers for those of us who are marginalized and oppressed in this society."

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Pitzer President Laura Trombley Crashes Car Into Grove House in Ironic Tragedy

Wednesday night proved terrifying for the students of Pitzer College when President Laura Skandera Trombley crashed her Mazda MX-5 racecar into the rear of the Grove House, the institution's beloved eating establishment.

At 1:34 a.m., Pitzer College Grove House caretaker Mia Henry, PI '09, awoke to the sound of a crash outside her window. When she went outside to see what happened, she saw Skandera Trombley, who is on sabbatical, in the driver's seat of a racecar, unharmed with a smile on her face.

"I just couldn't wait until May 1," said Skandera Trombley, referring to her expected return date. "I just love Pitzer College and all the improvements we have made in the last few years. After all, just look at the freshmen dorms. They're great." Campus security conducted

an investigation, which found that Skandera Trombley had driven her car to Blue Fin Sushi, at the corner of Foothill Boulevard and Claremont Boulevard. Business owners spotted Skandera Trombley's Mazda and telephoned Claremont Police to report possible drunk driving.

While Skandera Trombley passed all sobriety tests, Claremont Police warned the community of the president's demeanor.

"I just had to come back," said Skandera Trombley. "My son Sparky began to complain that I spent too much time volunteering at his middle school. In addition, I figured that Pitzer missed me."

Acting president Peter Nardi applauded her arrival as a testament to Skandera Trombley's commitment to allowing kids to have cars on campus.

"I think it is just great that Laura could arrive in such style," said Nardi. "The Grove House is one of the most treasured Pitzer establishments. For Laura to literally drive into the Grove House is

an indication of her dedication to excellence. I think that the Grove House employees will remember this moment forever."

Nardi was right. According to a source that preferred not to be identified due to possible repercussions informed *The Student Life* that Rachel Vandervorst, manager of the Grove House kitchen, has plans to commemorate the event in the form of a plaque.

"We are even going to start serving sandwiches, called 'Skandiches,'" said the source, referring to the president's middle name. "We are going to put a spicy, wasabi mayonnaise on the bread. Hopefully, it will be a hit!"

Not everyone was happy with the events of Wednesday morning. Scripps Vice President and Dean of Faculty Cecilia Conrad called the events abhorrent.

"It is an outrage that a woman of such a distinguished institution would show such second-rate taste in racecars," said Conrad of Skandera Trombley's Mazda MX-5. "Women all over the world

Works sell for thousands as protective parents outbid each other

This week the Montgomery Art Center is putting on a special exhibition, "Perspectives," a small but cohesive collection made by local second-grade students. Although the exhibit only opened this past Monday, faculty and staff have already been expressing their excitement. Kathleen S. Howe, director of the Montgomery Art Center called the paintings "masterpieces" and said that the exhibition is sure to be one of the best the college has seen this year. "I think these paintings show a free-spirited quality that we rarely see in art today." Some examples of this unconstrained technique can be seen in Annabelle Quinby's work as she dares to draw outside the lines in her Winnie the Pooh coloring book. Quinby also experiments with crayons, using unconventional colors such as lime green for Pooh Bear's body.

Another stand-out artist in the group, Ben Jagger, has an impressive style that draws from the great Impressionism masters such as Van Gogh in his use of finger dots. When looking at his work it is apparent that Jagger took a lot of time and consideration in the placement of his fingers on construction paper. In another piece titled "Polar Bear in a Snow Storm," Jagger moves away from his traditional Impressionistic style to a more minimalist approach by strategically placing three black dots on a white canvas to symbolize his favorite animal. Minimalist? Yes. Brilliant? Undoubtedly.

Some of the most impressive pieces come from Ashley Spence, who has a penchant for painting unusual shapes in her work. In her feature piece "My House," Spence depicts a circular building sitting next to a large drawing of a doll. In the sky, two cats play on top of clouds. The contrast in subject and size of the objects have already led many critics to call her work surrealist in style. Howe said that Spence's techniques "are similar to Salvador Dali's in that they juxtapose different images, forcing viewers to contemplate their true meaning."

Cody Banks, the last artist featured in the exhibition, uses his hands to create extraordinary pieces of art. In one piece titled "Thanksgiving," Banks used one of his hands to form the body of a turkey accented with warm colors such as red, orange and brown. In another piece, Banks used both of his hands to delicately shape a butterfly. In both pieces, Banks used an unusually large quantity of paint, giving his work a textured quality that is not seen from the other artists in the exhibition. In these pieces Banks shows his versatility as well as his ability to use his own body as a tool in his work.

"Perspectives" illustrates the ground-breaking techniques and unconventional tools that these young artists use to create their visionary masterpieces.

"Perspectives" runs until Apr. 11. Tickets are \$35 with student ID. Hear from the artists themselves at a artist lecture tonight at 5:30 p.m. Juice boxes and Ritz Bitz will be served.

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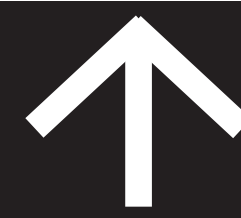

A Letter From David F—ing Oxtoby

To the Editor,

Like the metamorphic rock of the San Gabriel Mountains, Pomona's budget has been placed under severe stress in recent months. In light of the current economic crisis, effective in fall 2009 the Board of Trustees will set forth to establish a strategic plan: a five-year action agenda accompanied by a brief executive summary detailing a revision of Pomona's sustainability initiatives. The "greenification" of college policies will cut costs by an estimated five percent, although given the instability and capriciousness of the stock markets in recent weeks, we really have no f—ing clue what will happen to the college's ongoing economic wellbeing. The following outlines a few potential steps that the Deans, in association with the ASPC, are currently considering for inclusion in the policy memorandum, henceforth known as the Big Green Mean Machine:

I. Water

In order to curtail water wastage, students will be charged a nominal fee of five (5) cents for every trip to the washroom. Washing machines will be eliminated and replaced with washboards; students will be able to check out horse-hair scrubbers and handkerchiefs from the RA desks during regular hours.

II. Food

In addition to Trayless Tuesdays, Pomona dining services will also be cutting back on utensil usage. On weekends, plates will be removed from all dining halls. Students will be asked to cradle their omelets tenderly and carefully tackle their huevos rancheros. Furthermore, napkins will be replaced with reusable sanitary bibs distributed at freshmen orientation and to all

upperclassmen upon returning to campus.

Replacement bibs will be available for purchase at the Coop Store for \$5. Also, effective immediately will be Foodless Fridays. Students are encouraged to fast, find their inner chi, or eat at any of the other 5Cs.

III. Transportation

The Sagecoach, Pomona's premier mode of transportation, will be updated to improve fuel efficiency. First, the vehicle will be taken for an emissions test for the first time since its inauguration in 1993. Second, the Coach will be technologically transformed by: a) equipping the exterior

with solar panels a la Back to the Future, b) removing the floor, turning the aging mobile into a carbon-neutral Flintstone car, or c) welding a hybrid Honda Odyssey to the hood, offering extended seating and 24 miles to the gallon.

Currently, the College is working with the Village of Claremont to extend the route of the local trolley through the 5Cs. We expect that this policy will alleviate the extraordinary need for Pomona students to drive to dinner at Harvey Mudd.

IV. Energy

Students will be taxed commensurate to energy usage per kilowatt. High-use energy wasters—for example, students who run the air conditioning in December or brush their teeth in the shower—will be publicly shamed. Avid composters are welcomed to throw their decomposing material on those who break college sustainability policies. Twenty hours of community service at the Farm will also be required of repeat offenders.

When the outdoor temperature remains between 65 and 75 degrees Fahrenheit, professors will be required to hold class outside. During these hours, all electricity will be turned off in academic buildings.

V. Waste and Recycling

Table tents, otherwise known as useless fliers about KSPC shows, PSU events, and Pub, will be eaten by Sustainability Fellows.

As always, students are encouraged to add their commentary to the growing log cached next to Food Committee reports and confiscated hammocks in the depths of the SCC.

We will be holding a forum in Frank Dining Hall at an undisclosed hour for all interested in participating in this important dialogue.

Uh oh. No cell reception. I'm really in deep sh't now.

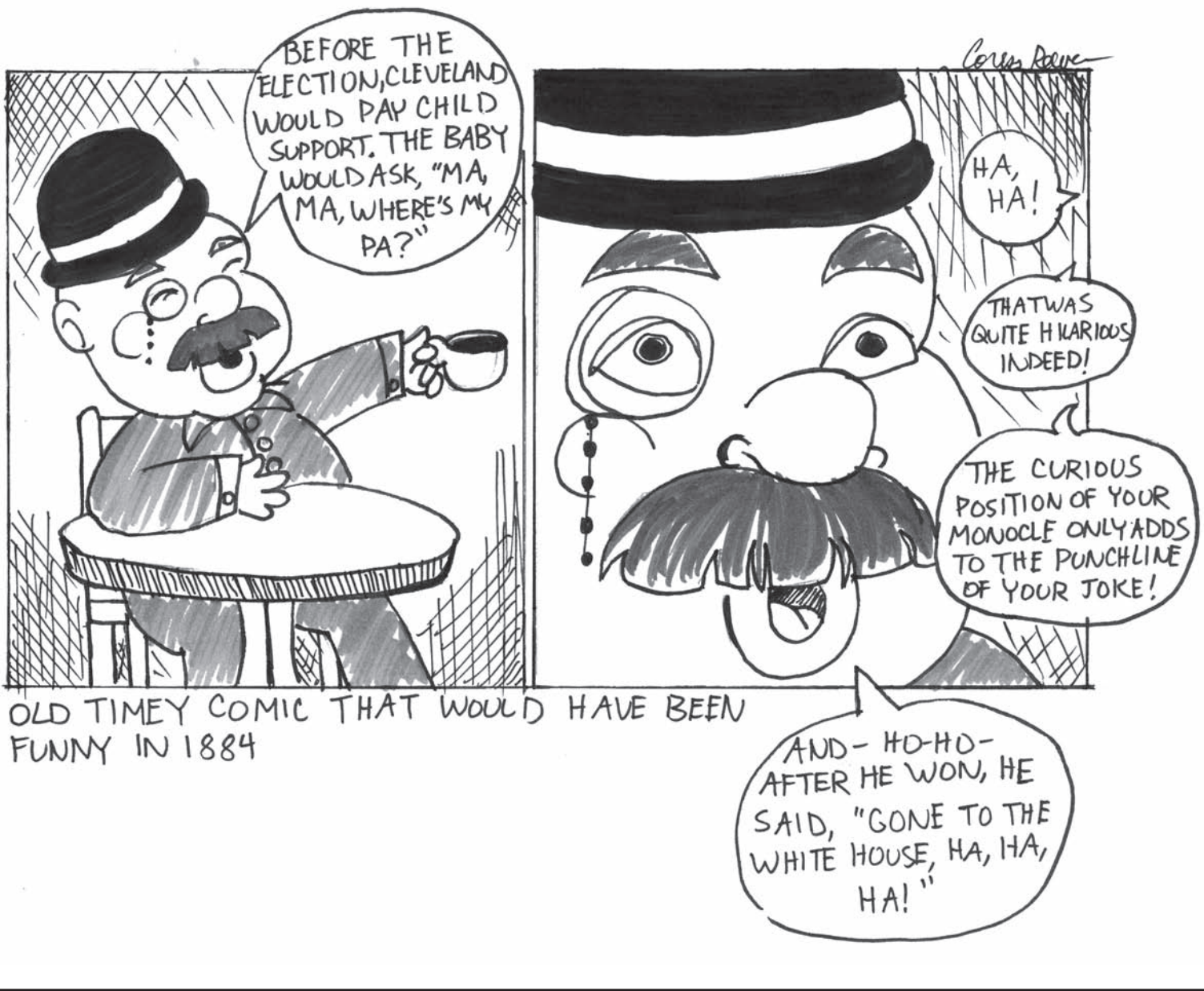
Day 5

Pomona's Medieval Codes: It's Time for a Change

This Monday, Director of Athletics Mike Sutton CM '76 approved the use of a Stag named "Ducey" in honor of longtime athletic director, Ted Ducey, before all Stag football games. Said Sutton, "We felt like we needed a boost in attendance and support and feel that Ducey will do just that."

Ducey, born sometime in 2004, is a California Mule Deer, raised by longtime CMC superfans Kyle Ellison CM '06, Gui Schils CM '09, Ryan Berber CM '09 and Brian Furerst CM '09. "We felt like we needed to give something back to the school," Berber said. "we agree with Mr. Sutton that this is the perfect fit for CMS athletics going forward."

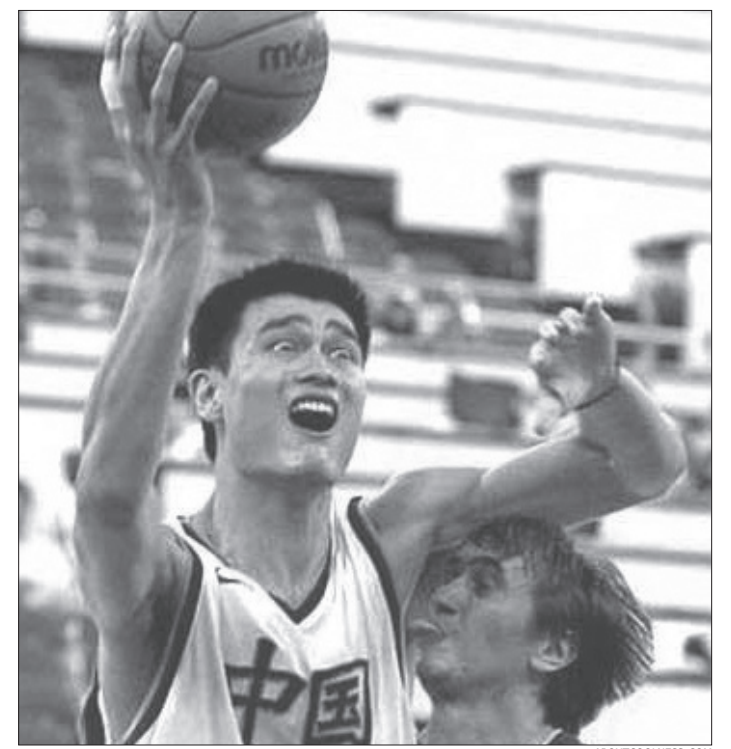
The stag will be kept on the lawn of the brand new Bizantz Family

Bengals Hire Starks as New Head Coach

CINCINNATI - The ownership group of the Cincinnati Bengals made front page news yesterday when it announced the hiring of 12-year-old Johnny Starks to be the franchise's new head coach. Starks is the newest face of the NFL's youth movement in coaching, following in the footsteps of Mike Tomlin in Pittsburgh, Raheem Morris in Tampa Bay, Josh McDaniels in Denver, and the recently deposed Lane Kiffin in Oakland.

"Every since I was a little boy, I always dreamed of one day coaching an NFL team," said Starks. "Some of the kids at school said it would never happen, but I always had faith."

This decision marks the end of the Marvin Lewis era in Cincinnati, a six-year run that produced only one playoff appearance despite significant talent on the roster. Sadly, Lewis's tenure was known more for the criminal activities of his players than for their performance on the field.

Critics of the move cite Starks' woeful inexperience and cast doubt on his ability to handle the responsibilities of a head coaching job. Starks' resume highlights "five years of pretty intense Madden football," as well as a year as the towel boy for the Pittsburgh Steelers.

"Pittsburgh is a classy organization," commented Bengals general manager Mike Brown. "They produce winners. You have to admire the kid's pedigree."

Starks should have an advantage over the 50-year-old Lewis in relating to the Bengals players, most of whom have the maturity of 12-year-olds. In fact, he already

won over the offensive line by belching the alphabet and beating Halo 3 on legendary mode.

"He's just like one of us," said wide receiver Chad Ocho Cinco (née Johnson). "Plus, I have an illegitimate child about that age. They can have sleepovers and everything!"

Some members of the media have expressed concern that a locker room full of convicted felons is no place for a child. Starks, however, asserted that he had experience with dangerous situations before.

"I'm not as innocent as I look," said Starks. "One time, Mrs. Harris gave me detention for throwing an eraser at a girl I liked, so I know where these guys are coming from."

Starks' parents are fully confident that their youngest son is up to the task.

"We told him to always try to solve his problems with words," explained Robert Starks, Johnny's father, "especially when the guys he is having problems with can bicep curl him in one hand."

The Bengals hope that Starks can breathe new life into the moribund franchise and help them compete with their AFC North rivals, the Steelers and the Baltimore Ravens. Given his extensive experience with Madden Football, Starks will also inherit play-calling

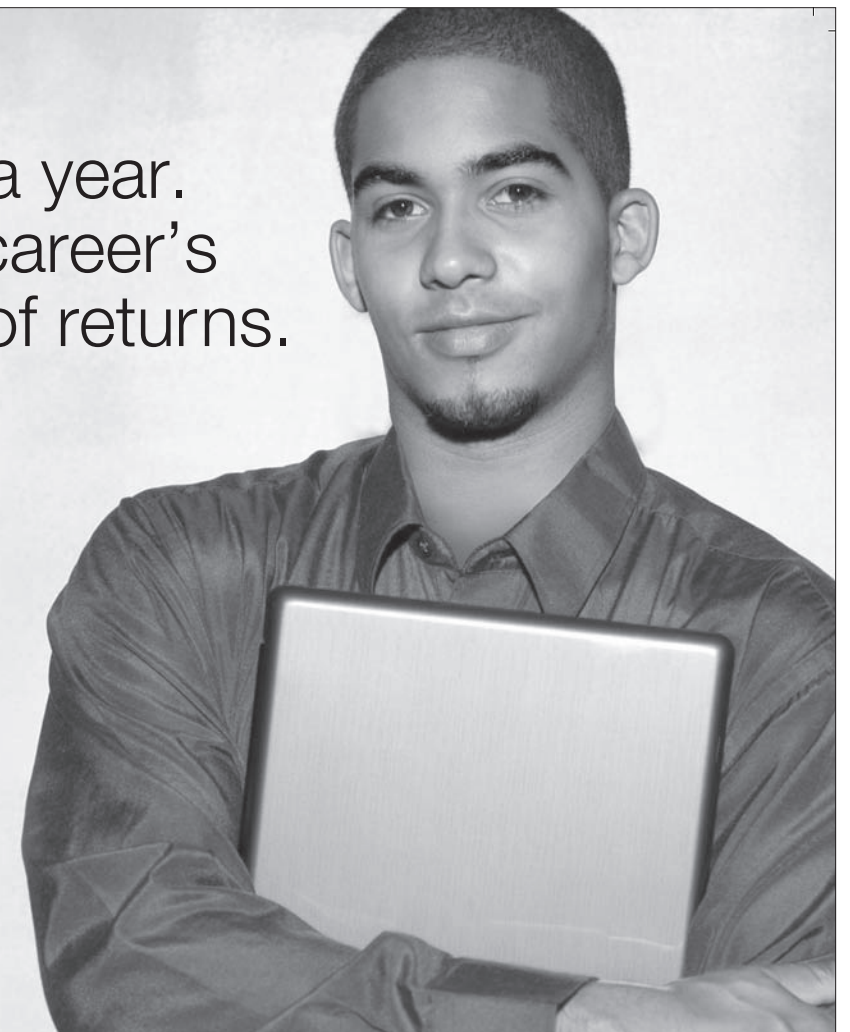
responsibilities. He brings with him several created playbooks and a child-like imagination for football's X's and O's.

"I'm excited to test my skills on this stage," said Starks. "Madden won't let me draw up any plays with laterals or reverses, but I still managed to win the Super Bowl on All-Madden with the Houston Texans three years in a row. Just imagine what I'll be able to do now!"

While Starks and his coaching staff have refused to comment on the matter, sources report that the Bengals have already entered into negotiations with the Falcons over disgraced former star quarterback Michael Vick. The same sources previously revealed that Starks' favorite version of Madden is 2004, where Vick's combination of arm strength and speed made him virtually unstoppable. It seems that Starks believes that he can return Vick, who has spent the last year in federal prison, to the form that saw him dominate the video-game world just five short years ago.

Only time will tell whether Starks' hiring was a brilliant strategy or a mistake on the part of Bengals management. One thing is certain though: the youngest head coach in NFL history by nearly 20 years is dead serious about turning the Bengals into a playoff contender before he turns 15.

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P-P and CMS Athletic Departments Hope to Merge to Create D-I Program

Recently, as the collective strengths of the Claremont-Mudd-Scripps and Pomona-Pitzer athletic programs have become evident both within the Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAAC) and on the national level, the respective programs have begun to talk about combining their teams to form a single, 5-C Division I Varsity program. While both schools have long histories of rivalry and excellence as separate entities, there has become a want and need for a greater platform on which to perform as the teams have begun to truly outpace their competition. Looking into the history of 5-C sports,

the original programs included the first dual-school team with Pomona and Claremont Men's College as partners in 1946, going on to great success in SCIAAC. In 1956 the two schools separated and the teams began to compete as different entities. Currently on campus, there are several Division I club sports: mens lacrosse, rugby, volleyball, Ultimate Frisbee, roller hockey and womens rugby, volleyball, and lacrosse. These programs have shown their strength repeatedly as Division I teams from the Pac-10 and others have fallen to the collective 5-C strength.

In light of the obvious benefits of fusing sports programs, Mike Sutton and Charles Katsiaficas, athletic directors of CMS and P-P, respectively have decided to put in motion

what fellow founding member of the SCIAAC conference, USC, cited as a desire to compete against larger schools. This move will allow the 5-C name to gain recognition nationwide as a prominent sports program and will bring a larger amount of higher-level athletic participation to the campuses. Official announcements of the change have not been made, but the athletic offices have been buzzing with the prospect of D-I programs.

With the creation of a single athletic program, some have begun to wonder what will become of current varsity coaches that will be not needed as deemed by NCAA regulation. In response to this, the directors have put together a formula that will be based on records of current coach-

ing staff, history with the colleges, as well as student-athlete voting. This process, intended to bring out the best in the coaching staff as well as athletes will hopefully fill the need that the Claremont sports programs have shown for more difficult competition.

As this fledgling program will have many current D-III level competitors, a simple discernment and cut process will be used as well as an implementation of customary scholarships for all sports teams. The expanded program will give a new face to the athletic makeup, as well as recruiting for the colleges. A higher level of athlete will now become present at the colleges, beginning next year as player recruitment has been given the ability to use the prospect of the D-I sports programs. The expectation is that the change will occur in the 2010-2011 sports season, with the 5-C teams beginning competition as an independent team, hopefully making successful bids into the Pac-10 or West Coast Conferences. As far as a mascot for the new 5-C team, both programs want their respective mascots to be carried over, but as debate has grown heated over which to use, there will likely be some wide-scale voting or creation of a new mascot for the new program.

Current sports fields will remain as they are, to be used for a club team format much like the current clubs present on campus. Intramurals between the schools will also remain as they are. The sports administration offices would be moved to Pomona while home venues will be split between the colleges. As this new change is brought about, the athletic directors look forward to the future ability for the 5-C sports teams to compete and be successful on a larger stage.

P-P Football Cut to Improve Sustainability on Campus

In a recent announcement from President David Oxtoby and Athletic Director Charles Katsiaficas, the Pomona and Pitzer communities were informed that the Sagehen football team, founded in 1892, would not participate in the upcoming 2009 season and could potentially be permanently disbanded. According to President Oxtoby, this decision was reached as a way to further the goals of Pomona's long-term sustainability plan.

"Although the football team has been an integral part of the Pomona-Pitzer athletic program for decades, we all know that the future of the planet is at stake!" Oxtoby exclaimed in an e-mail to the student body.

This past year saw numerous studies undertaken to determine the carbon footprint and overall impact of the P-P football team on the environment. Sustainability coordinator Bowen Patterson found that this impact was surprisingly enormous. "I mean, think about it," said Patterson. "The field they play on needs lots of water to make the grass grow, so we can use this reclaimed water for other things, like putting it in the pools. And the team needs lights to practice at night, so cutting off the lights can reduce the school's energy consumption."

If the decision to permanently terminate the football program is finalized, Katsiaficas said that the preliminary plans to demolish Merritt Field, the Sagehens' home stadium named after the most successful coach in team history, will be put into action.

"Once the football program is ended, we'll bring in some huge bulldozers and level the sustainability-destroying field," said Katsiaficas. "In its place, we'll put lots of trees, because trees are good for sustainability. Right?"

Patterson speculates, however, the greatest savings for sustainability will arrive from changes in food consumption. As the football players need to eat many more calories than an average student to maintain their weight in the middle of an intense football season, ending the football program can cut back on food consumption, reducing carbon

dioxide emissions from trucks and the fertilizer and animal waste from farms.

"Without the need to eat so much protein, they all can become vegan too," said Patterson.

Since the decision to terminate the program would likely result in the dismissal of the team's coaches, Katsiaficas has taken great pains to ensure that they will be adequately compensated for their service to the Pomona community.

"The P-P athletics program values all of the hard work the football coaches have put in, so we'll be giving them a generous severance package if they are let go," said Katsiaficas.

"But only sustainably generous, of course," he quickly added.

Head coach Roger Caron was particularly receptive to the school's position on his future job security.

"I know this change means that I won't have the chance to watch my son finish his collegiate football career, but at least I'll have more time to work on my interests in sustainability," he said.

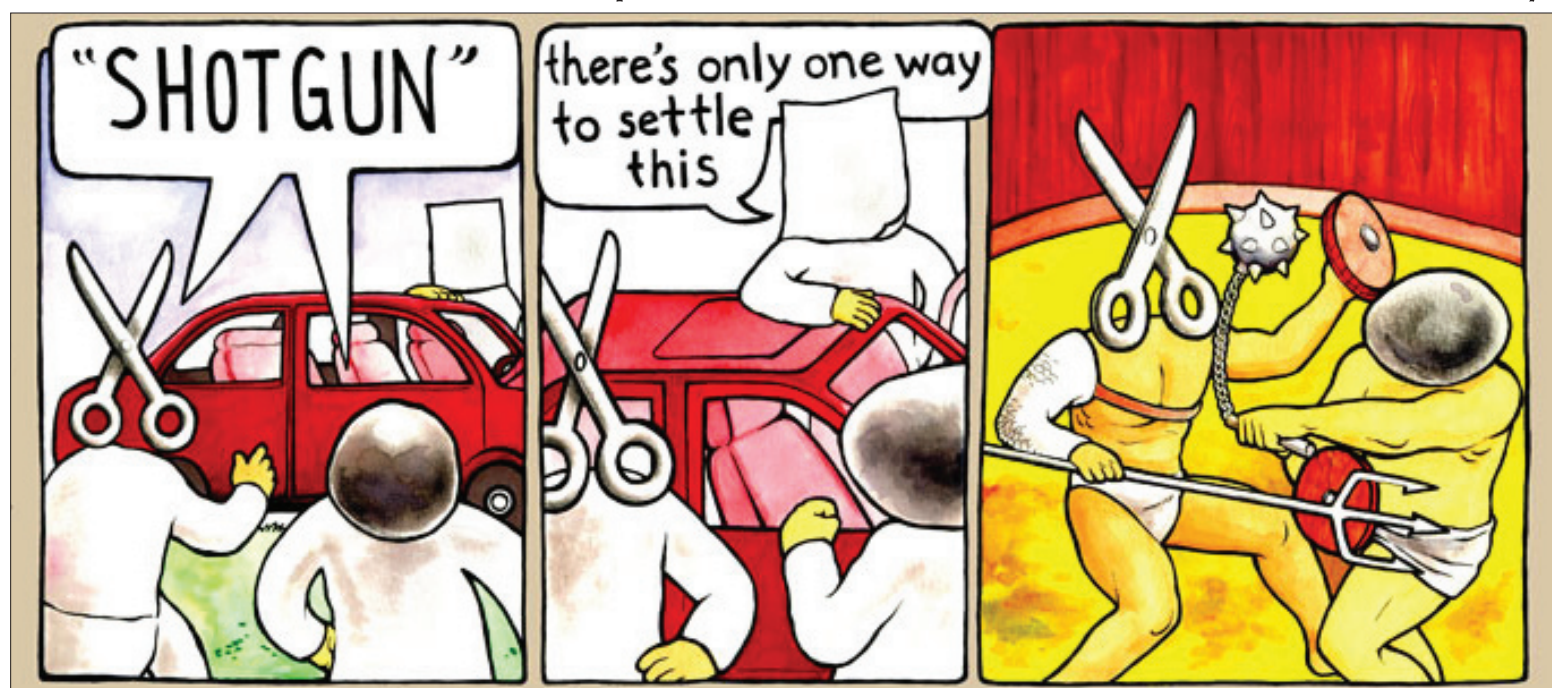
Katsiaficas only provided the details of Caron's severance package, which amounted to Caron gaining the use of Pomona's private jet to fly to different organic farms across the country, working there to promote sustainable agriculture.

Although there were some initial concerns that the athletes themselves would be the most resistant group to the administration's decision, they were actually the most receptive to the idea of ending one of the most important parts of their college lives.

"I always thought that playing football was important to me, since it built character and teamwork, promoted fitness, and encouraged school spirit," said one of the team's linebackers. "However, after hearing about how much damage I personally do to the environment, I realized that all of that other stuff doesn't matter when sustainability is at stake."

In the efforts of even further increasing sustainability, many of the players have now taken it upon themselves to take a semester off to embark on a bus tour, driving around the country to promote the virtues of sustainability and the dangers of football to high school and college students.

5-C Students to Compete in First Annual RPS Tourney

"I remember the eight-and-under championship that year [of northern California]," he explained, "I was one rock away from the USARPSL nationals." Balancing the sport with basketball, for which he competes on Pomona-Pitzer's team, he racked up the national titles coming through the juniors. "I thought long and hard about going pro, but I didn't want to lose my [NCAA] eligibility for basketball," he said. He did not rule out the option of turning pro after his junior year of college.

Caroline Flynn PO '09, goalkeeper for P-P, has reportedly said that she wants to end her career with a victory of this magnitude, but it is not known whether she will compete.

Her counterpart at CMC, Camila Friedman-Gerlicz CM '10, known for her quick limbs, could be a dark horse

in this competition as well.

The game of Rock, Paper, Scissors evolved from "Rock-Tablet-Spear," invented by our caveman ancestors, which decided who would have to gather fruit, who got the biggest cave, and who got the most desirable wife.
